# **Speakers' Biographies**

## **DANIEL ACHTERHOLT**

German Armed Forces Command

Captain Daniel Achterholt is a German Airforce Officer and serves in the German Armed Forced Command USA and Canada in Reston, VA. He is the Head of logistics and his tour of duty is scheduled for a time period of three years. Captain Achterholt was trained and deployed as a Transportation Officer from 2010-2013 and was also a subject teacher for computer science in economics. In 2009, Captain Achterholt received his degree as an industrial engineer from the Helmut Schmidt University in Hamburg, Germany. Previously he passed his officer's training in 2006.

Dr. Annegret Bendiek is senior associate of the EU/ Europe Research Division at the Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik (German Institute for International and Security Affairs, SWP) in Berlin. Her areas of expertise are the United States, common foreign security policy, cyber-security, EU foreign policy, the European Union, justice and home affairs in the EU, strategic partnerships, and transatlantic relations. She has held a number of research, academic, and government positions. She was recently at the German Federal Foreign Office as a member of the Policy Planning Staff, and previously worked as a fellow at the German Marshall Fund and the Transatlantic Academy, and as a junior professor at the University of Bielefeld.

# **FELIX BERENSKÖTTER**

Dr. Felix Berenskötter is Senior Lecturer (Associate Professor) in International Relations at SOAS, University of London. He specializes in international theory; concepts of friendship, identity, security, power, space, and time; European security and transatlantic relations, and he has published on these topics in various outlets. He is co-founder and former chair of the Theory Section of the International Studies Association (ISA) and currently an Associate Editor of the *Journal of Global Security Studies*, a new ISA journal published with Oxford University Press. Dr. Berenskötter received his PhD from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) and a Master's degree in Political Science from Rutgers University, where he was a Fulbright Scholar (2000-2002). Before coming to SOAS in 2009, he was a Research Associate at the Department of War Studies, King's College London, and a Research Fellow at the John Sloan Dickey Center for International Understanding, Dartmouth College.

## **LILY GARDNER FELDMAN**

Dr. Lily Gardner Feldman is currently the Harry & Helen Gray Senior Fellow at the American Institute for Contemporary German Studies at Johns Hopkins University, where she has recently published a book entitled Germany's Foreign Policy of Reconciliation: From Enmity to Amity (Rowman & Littlefield). She also directs the Institute's Society, Culture & Politics Program. She has a PhD in Political Science from MIT. From 1978 until 1991, Dr. Gardner Feldman was a professor of political science (tenured) at Tufts University in Boston. She was also a Research Associate at Harvard University's Center for European Studies, where she chaired the German Study Group and edited German Politics and Society; and a Research Fellow at Harvard University's Center for International Affairs, where she chaired the Seminar on the European Community and undertook research in the University Consortium for Research on North America. From 1990 until 1995, Dr. Gardner Feldman was the first Research Director of AICGS and its Codirector in 1995. From 1995 until 1999, she was a Senior Scholar in Residence at the BMW Center for German and European Studies at Georgetown University. She returned to Johns Hopkins University in 1999. Dr. Gardner Feldman has published widely in the U.S. and Europe on German foreign policy, German-Jewish relations, international reconciliation, non-state entities as foreign policy players, and the EU as an international actor. Her work on Germany's foreign policy of reconciliation has led to lecture tours in Japan and South Korea.

## **KRISTEN GUNNESS**

**RAND Corporation** 

Kristen Gunness is Adjunct Senior Fellow for China Affairs at the RAND Corporation, where she specializes in Chinese military and foreign policy issues. Formerly, Ms. Gunness served as the Director of the Navy Asia Pacific Advisory Group at the Pentagon, where she advised the Chief of Naval Operations on security, maritime, and foreign policy trends in East Asia. Prior to her position on the Navy staff, she was Senior Project Director for Chinese military and security affairs at CNA. Ms. Gunness has extensive experience studying, living, and working in China. She is a graduate of the Hopkins-Nanjing Center for Chinese and American Studies, and has studied Mandarin at Beijing Capital Normal University and the Harbin Institute of Technology. In addition, she worked as a business consultant in a well-established Shanghai firm, where she spent several years consulting and traveling in China, Taiwan, and Southeast Asia. Ms. Gunness has written extensively on Chinese security, foreign policy, and economic affairs. She is the co-editor of *Civil-Military Relations In Today's China: Swimming In A New Sea* (M.E. Sharpe, June 2006). She holds an MA in Security Studies from Georgetown University's Walsh School of Foreign Service.

# **GINA JONES**

Defense Intelligence Agency

Gina Jones currently serves as the Special Adviser to the Deputy Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA). In this capacity, she leads the development and implementation of strategic initiatives across the Agency. Gina began her intelligence career as an Intelligence Officer in the U.S. Air Force, which included a deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Between 2006 and 2008, she served as a Senior Consultant to U.S. Army South, the element responsible for U.S. Army operations in Latin America. In 2008, Ms. Jones joined DIA as one of the initial members of U.S. Africa Command. Within the intelligence directorate, she led a small, multi-disciplined team of intelligence analysts, tasked with infusing analysis and operational planning with socio-cultural analysis. Her analysis directly supported policymakers and operational planners and shaped the command's engagements with African partnernations. Ms. Jones was recognized for her contributions as a lead analyst within the Intelligence Crisis Cell

that supported coalition operations in Libya. Ms. Jones has advanced degrees from the U.S. Army School of Advanced Military Studies, the University of Kansas, and Boston University. A Council on Foreign Relations Term Member, she is originally from San Antonio, TX.

## **STEVEN KEIL**

The German Marshall Fund of the United States

Steven Keil is a program officer at the German Marshall Fund in Washington, DC, where he focuses on GMF's foreign and security policy work. Mr. Keil also works on issues surrounding the German-U.S. relationship, the broader transatlantic relationship, and the politics of the post-Soviet space. Prior to joining GMF, he was a fellow with the Robert Bosch Foundation in Berlin, where he conducted work placements in the CDU/CSU Foreign Policy Working Group in the Bundestag, as well the Eastern European and Eurasian Research Division at the Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik. Mr. Keil also worked in the United States Senate for the personal office of U.S. Senator John Thune (R-SD), having served as a legislative aide advising the senator on energy, environment, and agricultural issues. During his time in the Senate, Mr. Keil's legislative portfolio also included Constitutional issues, international affairs, and the judiciary. He received his bachelor's from the University of South Dakota in political science, German, and history and holds a master's from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service BMW Center of German and European Studies. He speaks German and basic Russian.

#### MAGDALENA KIRCHNER

Dr. Magdalena Kirchner is currently a Transatlantic Postdoctoral Fellow in International Relations and Security (TAPIR) at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP). Prior to that, she worked as Senior Project Coordinator at the German Atlantic Association and as Associate Fellow at the Transatlantic Relations Program of the German Council of Foreign Relations (DGAP). Since 2009, she also works as editorial journalist for the *Security Policy Reader*, jointly published by the Federal Ministry of Defense and the German Armed Forces. 2010-2012, she was working as a lecturer at the Institute for Political Science at the University of Heidelberg and head of the Working Group "Conflicts in the Middle East and Maghreb" of the Heidelberg Institute for International Conflict Research. Dr. Kirchner studied Political Science (International Relations) and History and holds a doctoral degree from the University of Heidelberg.

# **ADAM KLEIN**

Adam Klein is a Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellow and a Visiting Fellow at the Center for a New American Security. His research focuses on the intersection of national security policy and law. Before coming to CNAS, Mr. Klein was a Senior Associate at Wilmer Cutler Pickering Hale and Dorr LLP. He previously served as a law clerk to Justice Antonin Scalia of the United States Supreme Court and Judge Brett M. Kavanaugh of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. Before attending law school, Mr. Klein worked on national security policy at the RAND Corporation and the 9/11 Public Discourse Project, the nonprofit successor to the 9/11 Commission. He began his career as a legislative assistant in the office of U.S. Representative C.W. "Bill" Young. Mr. Klein is a graduate of Columbia Law School and Northwestern University. From 2006-2007, he was a Robert Bosch Foundation Fellow in Berlin. He speaks German and French.

## **ERIC LANGENBACHER**

Georgetown University

Dr. Eric Langenbacher is an Associate Teaching Professor and Director of the Honors Program in the Department of Government, Georgetown University. Dr. Langenbacher studied in Canada before completing his PhD in Georgetown's Government Department in 2000. He was awarded a Fulbright grant in 1999-2000 and the Hopper Memorial Fellowship at Georgetown in 2000-2001 and was selected Faculty Member of the Year by the School of Foreign Service in 2009. His publications include *Power and the Past: Collective Memory and International Relations* (co-edited with Yossi Shain, 2010), *Dynamics of Memory and Identity in Contemporary Europe* (co-edited with Ruth Wittlinger and Bill Niven, 2013), *The German Polity*, 10<sup>th</sup> edition (co-authored with David Conradt, 2013), and *The Merkel Republic: An Appraisal* (2015). He has planned and run dozens of short programs about all aspects of U.S. government, culture, and public policy for partners from abroad, as well as for the U.S. Departments of State and Defense.

## **DAN LIM**

Georgetown University

Dan Lim is a former United States Air Force officer currently completing his Masters of Science in Foreign Service (MSFS) degree at Georgetown University. He is interested in shaping U.S. foreign policy related to European security and transatlantic relations. He is particularly interested in the future of NATO, as he served as a member of NATO's training mission in Afghanistan (2011-2012) and also just completed a summer internship at the US Mission to NATO (2015).

# **GALE MATTOX**

AICGS/U.S. Naval Academy

Dr. Gale A. Mattox is Director of the Foreign and Domestic Policy Program at AICGS and Professor, Political Science Department, at the U.S. Naval Academy. She is a former elected department chair and chair of chairs, and was awarded the Distinguished Fulbright-Dow Research Chair at the Roosevelt Center, the Netherlands, for spring 2009. Professor Mattox served on the Policy Planning Staff of the Department of State, was a Council on Foreign Relations Fellow at the State Department Office of Strategic and Theater Nuclear Policy, and an International Affairs Analyst at the Congressional Research Service. She has been a Bosch Fellow in Germany (also Founding President of the Bosch Alumni Association), NATO Research Fellow, and a Fulbright Scholar. Professor Mattox has held the offices of President (1996-2003) and Vice President of Women in International Security (WIIS), Center for Peace and Security Studies at Georgetown University, and served as Vice President of the International Studies Association and now co-chair of the ISA Women's Caucus. She has served on numerous boards, including the Tactical Advisory Council, Center for Naval Analysis, and the George Marshall Center Advisory Board in Germany, and now serves on the advisory boards of St. Mary's College Women's Center, the Forum for Security Studies, the Swedish National Defense University, and WIIS. Professor Mattox published, with A. Rachwald, Enlarging NATO: the National Debates, and Evolving European Defense Policies with C. Kelleher. She has co-edited Germany in Transition, Germany at the Crossroads, and Germany through American Eyes, and has published widely in scholarly journals. She holds numerous awards and has appeared on the Lehrer News Hour and other media outlets.

## **PARKE NICHOLSON**

Parke Nicholson is the Senior Research Associate at the American Institute for Contemporary German Studies. He oversees research program activities, grant writing, and currently works on U.S. and German foreign policy, transatlantic relations, EU-Asia relations, and workforce education. Previously, he worked at the Center for the National Interest and the Council on Foreign Relations. In 2008, he served on the foreign policy staff at Hillary Clinton's presidential campaign headquarters. He has also worked abroad in Austria and Germany: in 2005 through the Fulbright Program in Klagenfurt and in 2010-2011 as a Robert Bosch Foundation Fellow working in the German Foreign Office for the Coordinator of Transatlantic Cooperation and for Daimler AG's Political Intelligence unit in Stuttgart. His writings have appeared in ForeignAffairs.com, TheNationalInterest.com, *The Baltimore Sun*, and *The Diplomat*. He received his MA in International Relations from The Elliott School of International Affairs at The George Washington University and a BA in History and Violin Performance from The College of Wooster in Ohio.

# **ANN-KRISTIN OTTO**

Ann-Kristin Otto is desk officer for bilateral relations covering Central and Eastern Europe and international security policy at the political section of the German Ministry of Defense. Prior to joining the MoD, Ms. Otto worked at the German Bundestag as Advisor for military and security policy. She has also worked as Afghanistan Knowledge Manager at NATO ACT in Norfolk, VA, for NATO HQ in Brussels, and for ISAF's Regional Command North in Afghanistan. Before joining the institutional side of politics, Ms. Otto worked as a political scientist at think tanks in both Washington, DC (AICGS and CSIS) and Berlin (DGAP). She studied political science, holding a diploma from the Free University Berlin and a Master's degree from the Elliott School of International Affairs at George Washington University. Ms. Otto is a board member of Women in International Security Germany (WIIS.de), member of the transatlantic Atlantik Brücke e.V., and a member of the Berlin-based Körber Foundation network foreign policy.

## **MAY-BRITT U. STUMBAUM**

Freie-Universität Berlin

Dr. May-Britt Stumbaum is the Director of the NFG Research Group "Asian Perceptions of the EU" at the Freie Universität Berlin and Editor of the Blog "The SPEAR – Security and Politics in Europe-Asia Relations." Her previous positions include Executive Director of the China and Global Security Program at SIPRI, Fritz Thyssen Fellow at WCFIA (Harvard), and further senior positions at the German Council on Foreign Relations (DGAP) and Berlin Partner. Bridging policy and academia, Dr. Stumbaum worked at renowned think tanks in Europe, China, Taiwan, Australia, and New Zealand, the EU Delegation to China, and regularly at the German Ministry of Defense. She is a co-founder and former president of Women in International Security Deutschland (WIIS.de), a Reservist German Air Force Officer, and currently serves as the first female President of the Tönissteiner Kreis e.V. and as a full member at the CSCAP EU Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (CSCAP). Dr. Stumbaum graduated from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE / MSc) and the Freie Universität Berlin (PhD). She frequently comments on current Asian security affairs and their impact on Europe and transatlantic relations in the media (CNN, Al-Jazeera, N24, and others) and testified in 2012 to the U.S. Congress' U.S.-China Economic and Security Committee on EU-China security.

## **JANINA WEBER**

German Ministry of Defense

Janina Weber is currently a speechwriter for the German Chief of Defense. Prior to this position, she was a resident student at Command and Staff College at the Marine Corps University in Quantico, Virginia. From 2013 to 2014, Ms. Weber deployed to Afghanistan as a political advisor to the NATO Senior Civilian Representative at ISAF Headquarters in Kabul. Earlier in her career, she worked in the German Ministry of Defense as a desk officer for politico-military affairs and bilateral relations to Russia, South Caucasus, and Central Asia for six years. Ms. Weber earned a Master of Arts Degree in Political Science from Philipps University, Germany in 2007 then later a Master's Degree in Military Studies from Marine Corps University in 2015.

#### MICHAEL JOHN WILLIAMS

New York University

Michael John Williams studies international relations with a functional expertise in international security issues and a regional expertise on Europe, the EU, NATO, and U.S.-European relations. He is currently working on a book manuscript on Germany's role in world politics. At NYU, Dr. Williams directs the International Relations Program. His most recent publications include Science, Law and Liberalism in the American Way of War (Cambridge UP 2015), "The Afghan War, 2001-2012" in the Oxford Encyclopedia of American Military and Diplomatic History (Oxford 2012), and The Good War: NATO and the Liberal Conscience in Afghanistan (Palgrave 2011). He is also co-editor of the critically acclaimed edited volume Power in World Politics (Routledge 2007). Dr. Williams is a Fellow of the Inter-University Seminar on the Armed Forces and Society. He has held a Robert Bosch Fellowship in Germany, a Visiting Fellowship at the Rothermere American Institute at the University of Oxford & Nuffield College, and a DAAD Fellowship at the Bundeswehr Center for Military History and Social Science in Potsdam, Germany. He is a Senior Associate Scholar at the Center for European Policy Analysis in Washington, DC, and editor-inchief of the journal International Politics Reviews. Dr. Williams is a Stephen M. Kellen term member of the Council on Foreign Relations, a Fellow of the Inter-University Seminar on the Armed Forces and Society, and an alumnus of the International Summer Policy Institute at American University. He was an investigator in the Sustainable Peacebuilding Network, a collaborative research project involving 20 scholars from six countries, funded by the Carnegie Corporation of New York and directed by Prof. Roland Paris (Ottawa). From 2006-2008 Dr. Williams directed the Transatlantic Security Programme at the Royal United Services Institute for Defense and Security Studies in London. Educated at the universities of Delaware, Hamburg, Bath, Berlin, and Moscow, he earned his doctorate at the London School of Economics and Political Science.

## **DOMINIK WULLERS**

German Ministry of Defense

Captain Dominik Wullers is the chief spokesperson for the Resolute Support mission at the German Joint Forces Operations Command.
